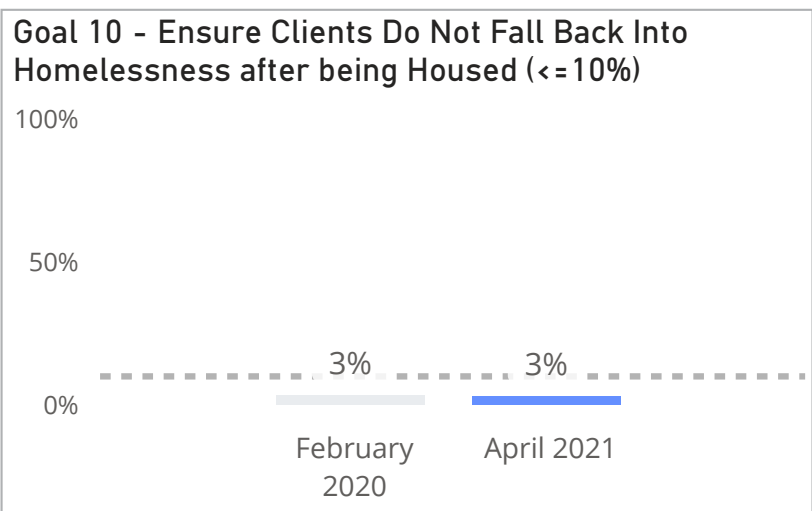
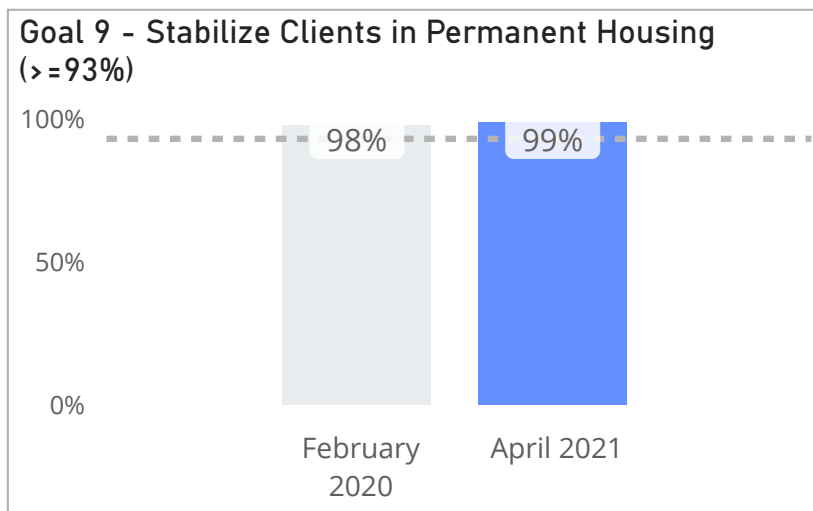
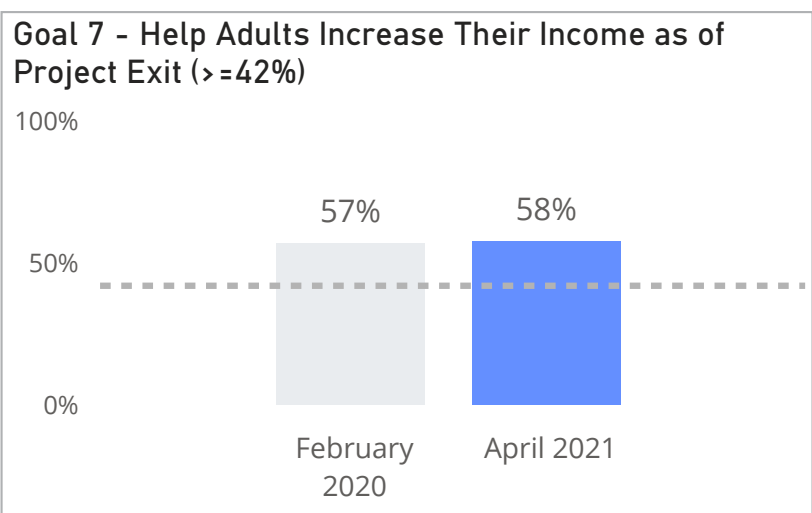
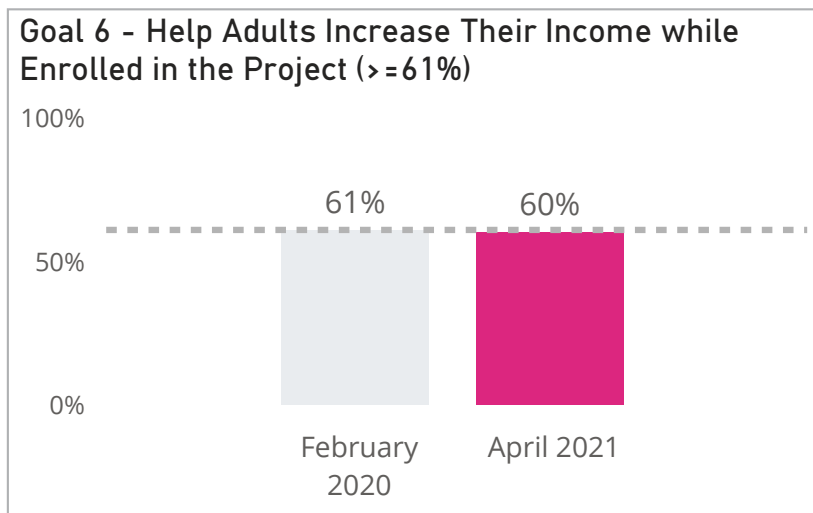
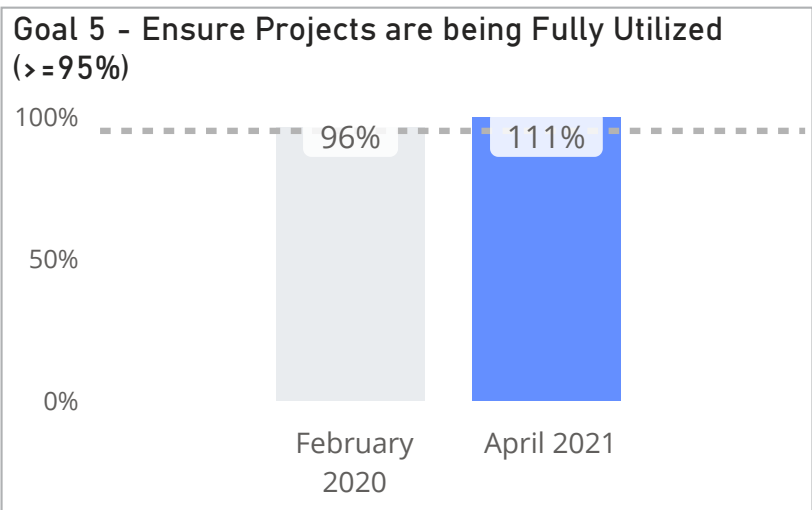
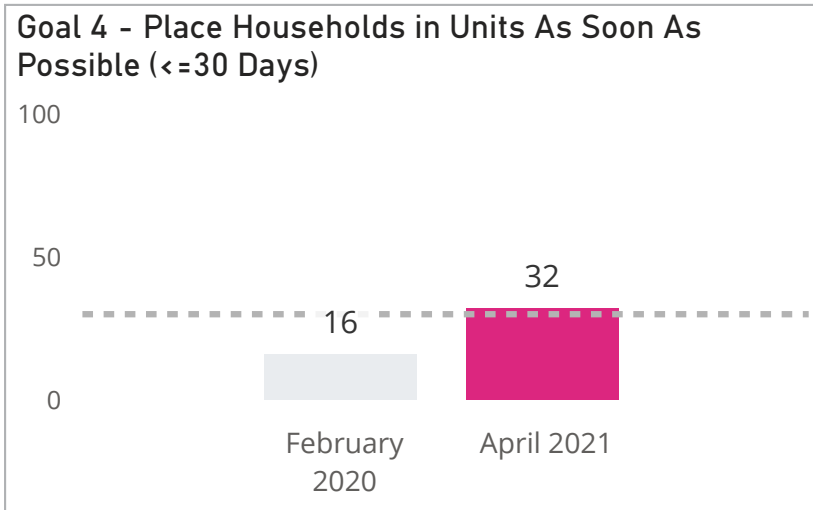
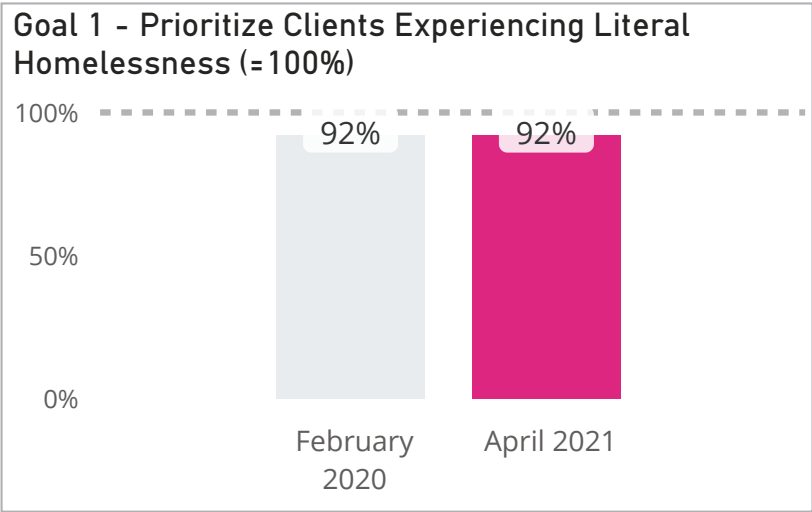


Orange County PSH-OPH Goals & Outcomes

PSH-OPH projects in the Orange County Continuum of Care (CoC) met **4 out of 7** thresholds as a project type.



Goal 1 - Prioritize Clients Experiencing Literal Homelessness

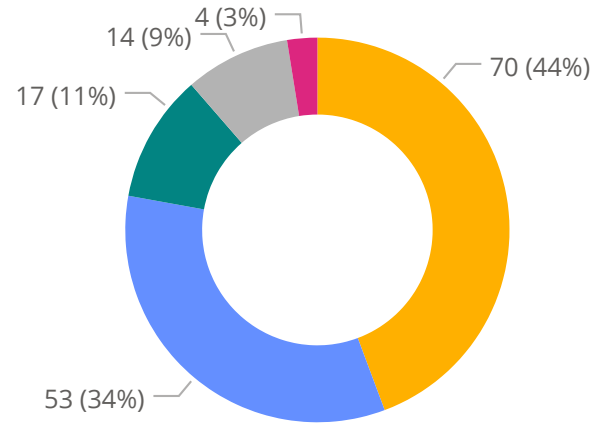
Orange County CoC Goal: 100% of head of household enroll in PSH-OPH projects from homeless situations.

Why? Enrolling clients from literal homeless situations is important because clients experiencing literal homelessness are among the most vulnerable of all Orange County residents experiencing homelessness.

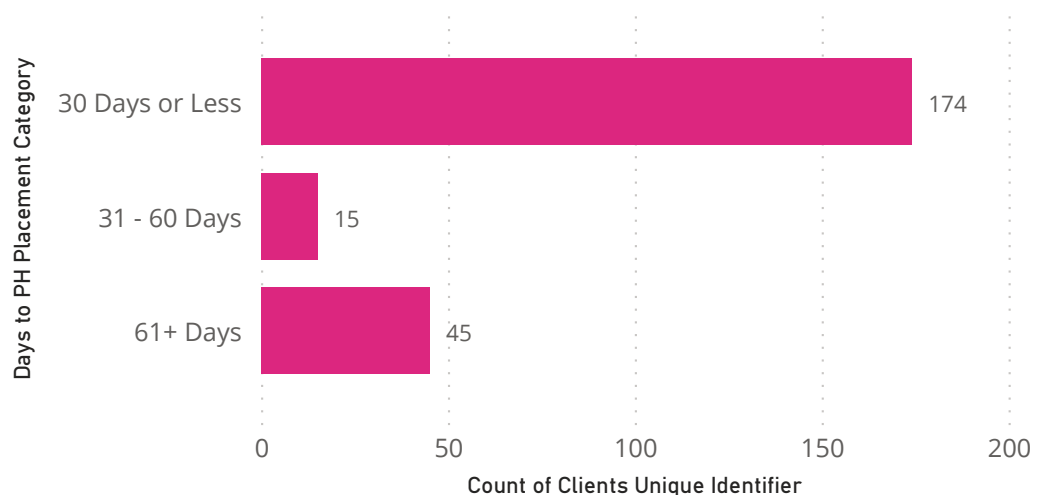
Goal 4 - Place Households in Units as Soon As Possible

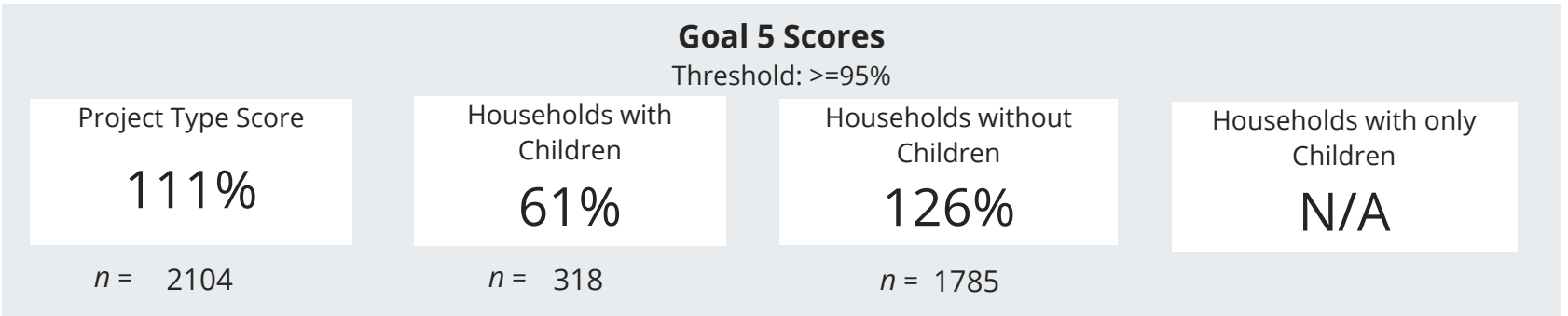
Orange County CoC Goal: Households are placed in permanent housing units within 30 days of entering the project.

Why? It is critical to place households into Permanent Housing as soon as possible.

Length of Days to Permanent Housing Placement



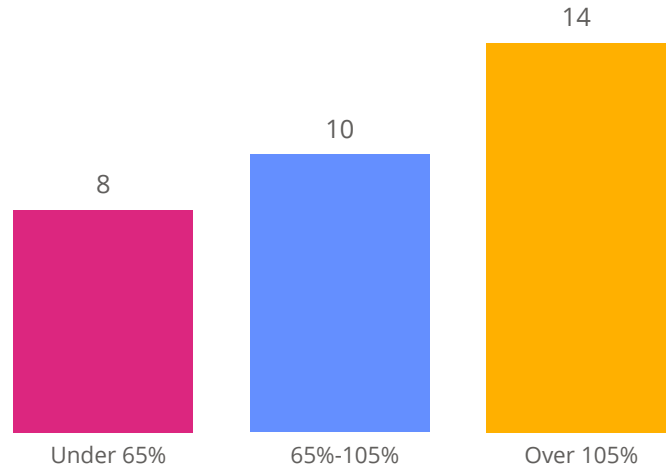
Goal 5 - Ensure Projects Are Being Fully Utilized



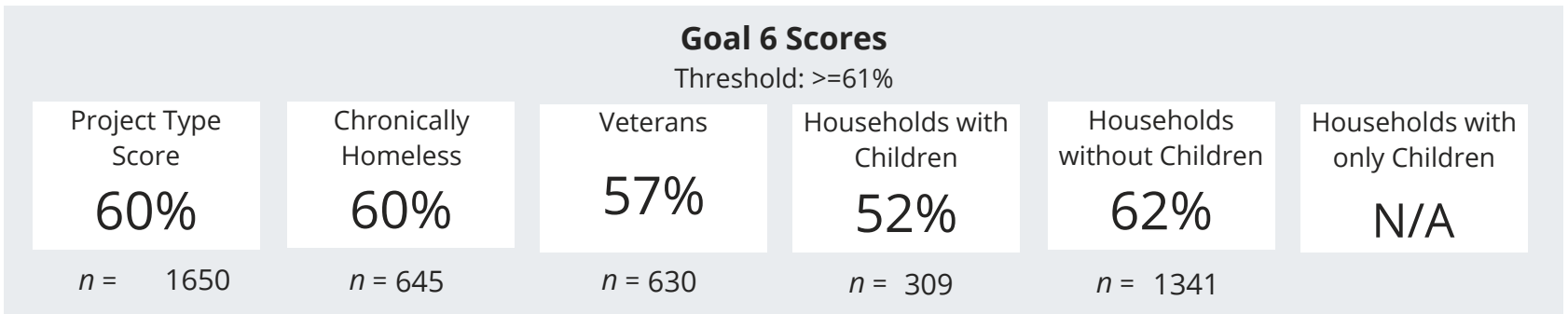
Orange County CoC Goal: PSH-OPH projects have a unit utilization score of at least 95%.

Why? Projects should be close to full occupancy to ensure as many clients as possible are stabilized in housing situation.

Goal 6 - Help Adults Increase Their Income while Enrolled in the Project

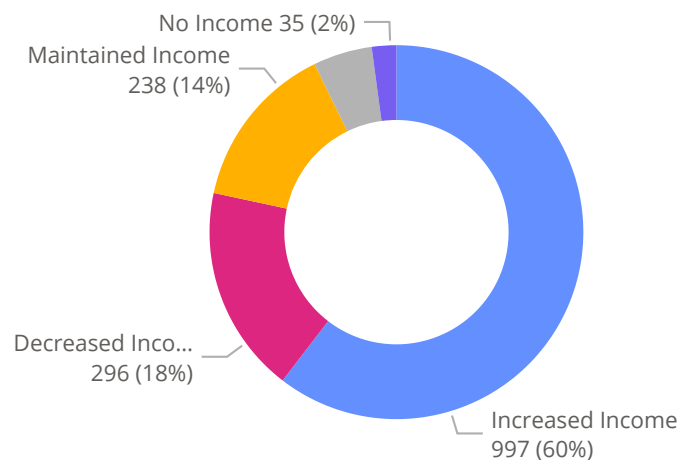


Orange County CoC Goal: At least 61% of adult clients who were enrolled in PSH-OPH project during the reporting period have maintained or increased their income while being enrolled in the project.

Why? Income is critical to maintaining most permanent housing situations.

Goal 7 - Help Adults Increase Their Income as of Project Exit

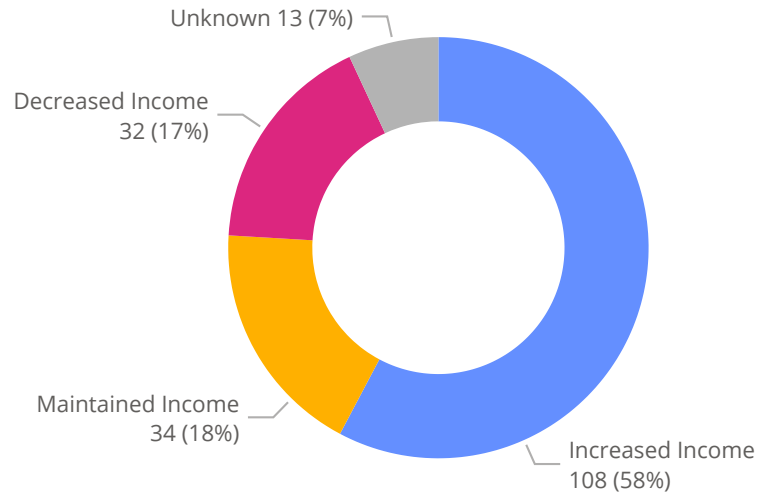

Orange County CoC Goal: At least 42% of adult clients who exited from a PSH-OPH project during the reporting period have increased their income between project entry and project exit.

Why? Income is critical to maintaining most permanent housing situations.

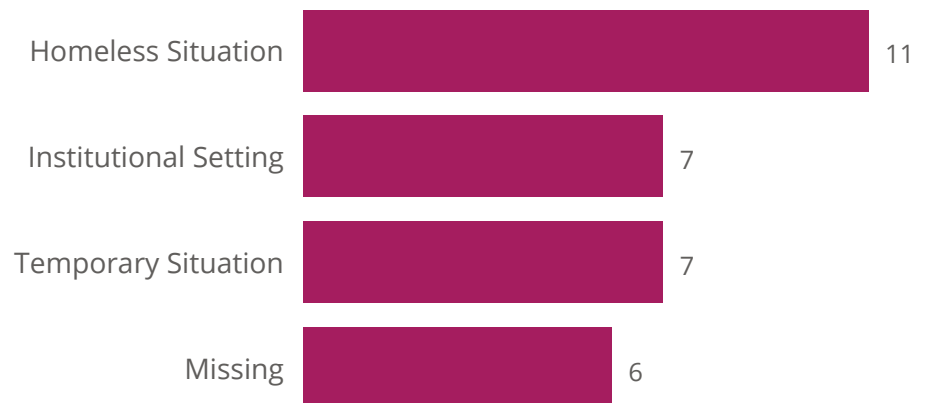
Goal 9 - Stabilize Clients in Permanent Housing

Orange County CoC Goal: At least 93% of PSH-OPH clients are stabilized while in permanent housing.

Why? Stabilizing clients in PSH-OPH projects help to prevent clients from falling into Homelessness.

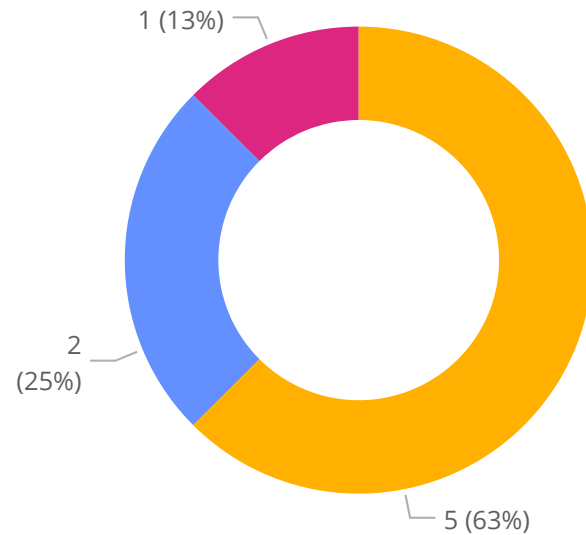

Orange County CoC Goal: No more than 10% of clients who exit from a PSH-OPH project to a permanent housing destination subsequently return to the system.

Efforts should be made to ensure that clients who receive homelessness prevention services are stabilized in their housing and can successfully maintain the housing at the end of the period of service provision. Repeat interventions are time consuming for both clients and service providers and can be mentally taxing for clients.
