


Transitional Housing projects in the Orange County Continuum of Care (CoC) met **4 out of 7** thresholds as a project type.





















### **Goal 1 - Prioritize Clients Experiencing Literal Homelessness**



**Orange County CoC Goal**: 100% of head of household enroll in Transitional Housing projects from homeless situations.

Why? Enrolling clients from literal homeless situations is important because clients experiencing literal homelessness are among the most vulnerable of all Orange County residents experiencing homelessness.


## **Goal 2 - Decrease Length of Stay in Temporary Shelter & Outreach**



**Orange County CoC Goal**: Transitional Housing project enrollments are no longer than 180 days from project entry to project exit.

**Why?** Clients in Transitional Housing projects are experiencing literal, unsheltered homelessness, which makes this population particularly vulnerable. The ultimate goal of Transitional Housing projects is to move people to sheltered or permanent housing situations.

#### Length of Days to Permanent Housing Placement




## **Goal 5 - Ensure Projects Are Being Fully Utilized**

#### **Goal 5 Scores** Threshold: >=80% Households with Project Type Score Households without Households with only Children Children Children 83% 93% 58% N/A n = 802n = 104n = 698

**Orange County CoC Goal**: Transitional Housing projects have a unit utilization score of at least 80%.

**Why?** Projects should be close to full occupancy to ensure as many clients as possible are stabilized in housing situation.

## Goal 6 - Help Adults Increase Their Income while Enrolled in the Project

Enrollments by Stayer Income Status

**Orange County CoC Goal**: At least 15% of adults who were active during the reporting period in Transitional Housing projects with a length of stay of at least 365 days have increased their income during their project enrollment.

**Why?** Income is critical to maintaining most permanent housing situations. Clients receiving intensive service from Transitional Housing projects that necessitate lengths of stay of 365 or more days should receive services that help to increase their income.





## Goal 7 - Help Adults Increase Their Income as of Project Exit



Orange County CoC Goal: At least 40% of adult clients who exited from a Transitional Housing project during the reporting period have increased their income between project entry and project exit.

**Why?** Income is critical to maintaining most permanent housing situations.




### **Goal 8 - Help Clients Exit to Successful Housing Situations**



**Orange County CoC Goal**: 75% of Transitional Housing enrollments exit to a permanent housing situation.

**Why?** The goal of Transitional Housing projects is to prevent clients from falling into Homelessness and place them into permanent housing.

#### Enrollments by Non-Permanent Exit Category






# Goal 10 - Ensure Clients Do Not Fall Back Into Homelessness after being Housed

Goal 10 Scores Threshold: <=10%

Orange County CoC Goal: No more than 10% of clients who exit from a Transitional Housing project to a permanent housing destination subsequently return to the system.

Efforts should be made to ensure that clients who receive homelessness prevention services are stabilized in their housing and can successfully maintain the housing at the end of the period of service provision. Repeat interventions are time consuming for both clients and service providers and can be mentally taxing for clients.
